## STORY OF THE PLAY

Just one year ago, Doc Nash's Free Health Clinic was facing closure. With a visit from the Undercover Boss, Lou Grant from the Matthew Chapter 25 Foundation approved a grant, thus saving the Clinic. But town councilwoman Beatrice Chandler now wants the Free Clinic closed. Her son will be opening a new medical practice and she doesn't want any competition. She pays a visit to Doc, hoping to buy him out. When Doc refuses, Mrs. Chandler storms away in anger as she is accustomed to getting what she wants. Then, the unthinkable happens - a fire! It destroys much of the Clinic and the home of Doc's neighbor, who barely escapes with his life! Initial reports from the fire inspector suggest arson! But who would do such a thing? And why? The mystery begins to unravel when Lou Grant returns and once again goes undercover. Sometimes we rush to judgment and place blame where it doesn't belong. This play teaches us to look for the good in people and to not be so quick to find fault. In the end, we see how friends and neighbors come together in times of adversity and loss. Those we least expect to help are often the ones who are the most generous and willing.

## **SETTING**

The living room and kitchen of the Nash family farmhouse in rural Baynesville, Virginia. Decor is simple and somewhat dated or old-fashioned. The living room is stage right. A sofa, rocking chair, coffee table and occasional chairs fill the room. An old afghan is tossed over the back of the sofa. A dining table with four chairs is center stage left, where much of the action takes place. Upstage of the dining table is a buffet or serving table, with a dining room cabinet as space allows. The upstage wall has an exterior window. The door to the kitchen is on the upstage left side of the room, and the door leading to the front porch is downstage left.

A Christmas wreath is on the downstage left exterior door, and a small candle and candle ring or Christmas figurine sit on the kitchen table throughout the play. A tree and other Christmas decorations are added just before Scene 5 to show a lapse of time.

## **CAST OF CHARACTERS**

(9 m, 6 w)

**DOC BEVERLY NASH:** Director of the Nash Free Clinic. In his late 50s or 60s.

**FRANCES:** Doc's wife, a nurse who works at the clinic. In her late 50s or 60s.

**MARY ALICE:** Inept receptionist, in her 30s with visible tattoos; she looks like Danielle from *American Pickers*.

**BUBBA PACKETT:** A real country boy! The only eligible bachelor in Baynesville.

**MRS. BEATRICÉ CHANDLER:** Member of the town council; everyone kowtows to her.

**LOUIS GRANT:** Private investigator in his 30s or early 40s. **LUTHER WASHINGTON:** Doc's neighbor, about 75 years old.

**CHARLIE CRANE:** A retired contractor, and a patient.

**DOTTIE JO CRANE:** Charlie's wife.

FRED WILKINS: Patient.
WILL BOTTS: Patient.
JENNY DOLEMAN: Patient.

**HENRY DOLEMAN:** Jenny's husband, a painting contractor.

CHRIS NICKS: Patient.

LORETTA LYNN SANDERS: Country girl, just moved to

Baynesville.

(AT RISE: It is Monday evening, December 9th, at the home of Doc and Frances Nash. DOC is seated at the kitchen table and FRANCES is serving soup into bowls while standing at the buffet.)

**DOC:** (Shivers.) Hope I'm not getting sick. I just felt a chill. **FRANCES:** Oh, I hope not! Probably just this cold spell. This soup is coming. Hope you're hungry. (Brings the bowls to

**DOC:** Make sure mine is good and hot. (Sips his coffee.) I'm going to go turn up the heat.

(DOC goes to the thermostat on the wall as FRANCES pours some water into glasses.)

**FRANCES:** Maybe this hot soup will warm you up. It is your favorite, Brunswick stew!

(FRANCES sits across the table from DOC. He smells of the soup, grabs her hand and smiles.)

**DOC:** I'm glad I wised up and asked you to be my wife, Frances.

**FRANCES:** I didn't think it would happen, you know, me and you, after all these years. But when the sparks started flying...

**DOC:** Yes, I remember those sparks! (Flirting.)

**FRANCES:** (Dismissing him.) Eat your soup, man, before it gets cold.

**DOC:** Now don't be embarrassed, Frances. It was just nature taking its course. It was meant to be.

**FRANCES:** And on Valentine's Day, we'll be celebrating our first anniversary.

**DOC:** (As they begin to eat.) These last twelve months have certainly been interesting.

**FRANCES:** Starting with the \$100,000 grant from the Matthew 25 Foundation.

**DOC:** That was a shock! I doubt the Free Clinic would still be open without it.

**FRANCES:** It sure has made life easier, not having to worry about money.

**DOC:** Say, when Lou was here, didn't he say he would be back this December with another check from the Foundation? Have you heard Mary Alice mention anything about it?

**FRANCES:** Trust me, if she had heard anything from Lou Grant, we would know about it. She fell fast and hard for that man.

**DOC:** Too bad he lives all the way up in D.C. They really hit it off, those two.

**FRANCES:** I did miss her but I'm not talking about me. Poor Bubba Packett has been coming by the clinic every evening, asking if I've heard from his "Suga."

**DOC:** I just don't understand that match-up. Mary Alice likes life in the fast lane and you just don't get much more redneck than Bubba Packett. I don't even know that boy's real name.

**FRANCES:** Uh...yes, you do. It's Bubba. That's what his momma and daddy named him.

**DOC:** For real? (FRANCES nods "yes.") But is he right for her? Doesn't seem like a match made in heaven.

**FRANCES:** No, I wouldn't say that either, but it was a match made in Baynesville. I think Jenny introduced them.

DOC: Little Beverly's mother?

**FRANCES:** Yes, she and Mary Alice have become really good friends since they met at the clinic last year. Bubba is one of her husband's hunting buddies.
