(4m, 5w, 1 child)

EDGAR BRITTENHAM: Mid 70's, kind-hearted, peace

maker of family, brother of Rufus and Percy.

PERCY BRITTENHAM: Early 70's, scatterbrained, lovable,

rambles a lot, brother of Edgar and Rufus.

RUFUS BRITTENHAM: 80-years-old, a grouch, dislikes

Christmas, brother of Percy and Edgar.

JANE HARTMANN: Mid 40's. Nurse on duty - has a special

fondness for Percy.

BERTHA BEIDLEMAN: Mid 50's. President of Ladies'

Auxiliary, very prudish in a comical sense.

MYRTLE STILLWELL: Mid 50's. Member of Ladies' Auxiliary, also very prudish in a comical sense.

STELLA MAYBURN: Mid 50's, another prudish Auxiliary member.

MARY JO STEPHENSON: Mid 30's, Rufus' daughter. Hasn't seen her father since her wedding day.

TERRY STEPHENSON: Late 30's. Mary Jo's husband, the

reason Mary Jo and Rufus haven't spoken.

ALLISON STEPHENSON: About 8-years-old, their

daughter, has never met her grandfather.

CHRISTMAS ON MERRY LANE

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Playing Time: 45 minutes.

SETTING

Recreation room of Merry Lane Retirement Home, decorated for Christmas. SL is a comfortable furniture grouping of sofa, loveseat, chair and end table. CS is a card table and four chairs. SR is a Christmas tree only partially decorated. Exits are SR and SL.

SYNOPSIS

SCENE 1: Christmas Eve, morning.
SCENE 2: Christmas Eve, afternoon.
SCENE 3: Christmas Eve, evening.

PROPS

Scene 1: Books and newspapers on end table, cane and hearing aid for Rufus, tray with bowls and spoons and a chart for Jane.

Scene 2: Checker game on card table for Percy and Rufus, newspaper for Edgar, and charts for Jane.

Scene 3: Ribbons and tree decorations, foil-wrapped plate of cookies for Ladies, and shopping bag filled with presents for Mary Jo.

SCENE 1

(AT RISE: It is almost noon, Christmas Eve day . EDGAR is on couch reading a book, while PERCY is in chair reading the newspaper. JANE enters with RUFUS by the arm. In HIS other hand is his cane.)

RUFUS: Now slow down, will ya? Are we going to a fire or something? You dragged me all the way down the hall for heavens sake, let me alone.

JANE: (Sits RUFUS down in chair opposite PERCY.) Now. There you are! Don't you all forget the Christmas party tonight, it will start around 8 o'clock or so.

RUFUS: I'm not going! JANE: Yes, you are!

RUFUS: I'm telling you, I'm not going and that's final!

JANE: You'll have a lot of fun! Trust me!

RUFUS: Humph!

JANE: Everyone is going to the party, Rufus, remember that. I'm going to check on Mr. Peterson. Don't you take off any where, now! (Exits.)

RUFUS: Heavens to Betsy! Did you hear that? You can't get out of this prison.

EDGAR: This isn't a prison, Rufus!

PERCY: Yeah! There aren't any bars on the windows!

RUFUS: It's close enough! I'm telling you, the guards are disguised as nurses.

PERCY: Hey! It's Christmas! Time to deck the halls, jingle the bells, away the manger, and -

EDGAR: Rufus, he's right! It's Christmas, try and be happy!

PERCY: Yeah, I'm right and don't you forget it! (Makes face.)

EDGAR: You should be thankful.

RUFUS: Thankful? Happy? Edgar, what pray tell, do I have to be thankful for?

EDGAR: By the grace of God, you're still living and breathing, you've got your health, your family -

PERCY: (Interrupts) And two brand-new batteries for your

hearing aid!

RUFUS: I feel a whole lot better now! Thanks, Percy, for

cheering me up, you little twit!

PERCY: That's OK. What are brothers for? RUFUS: (Messes with hearing aid.) What? PERCY: (Louder.) What are brothers for?

RUFUS: Huh?! Ah!! This hearing aid's on the blink again.

Now what did you say?

PERCY: (Yells.) WHAT ARE BROTHERS FOR!!

(EDGAR covers his ears and RUFUS jumps.)

RUFUS: You don't have to shout! I'm not deaf, you know! And you say it is after 4:00? No wonder I'm tired. I've been sitting here all day long.

EDGAR: No, you haven't! It's only noon!!

RUFUS: Oh! (To PERCY.) I don't know why I even listen to you.

(JANE enters.)

JANE: All right, guys! How about a little snack?

EDGAR: Sounds good!

JANE: What would you like? Walnuts, peanut butter fudge, and sardines with white crackers on top!! (EDGAR and RUFUS are sickened by this.) Could I get you something else?

PERCY: Well ... (Thinks about it.)

JANE: How about some cottage cheese?

EDGAR: Sounds good to me, it's healthy and nutritious.

RUFUS: At our age, who needs nutrition? JANE: You all need to eat healthy, Rufus!

RUFUS: Wonderful! That's the fifth time this week, we've

eaten that stuff. Good ol' cottage cheese - yuck!

JANE: Now Rufus!

PERCY: (Puzzled.) I wonder where they came up with the name - cottage cheese? That sounds like a house cheese or something. I mean, cottage cheese comes from a cow,
