**COSTUMES:** All are dressed as pilgrims.

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## **OPTIONS FOR OPENING OF THE DRAMA**

Women can enter sanctuary while a hymn is being sung. Possible selections include: "There Is a Balm in Gilead," "Send Your Word," or "Heal Me, Hand of Jesus." The women might also enter in dim light and take their positions or enter during the reading of a scripture.

#### **SETTING**

Though there needn't be any kind of set as such, the scene opens with the women clustered together as if in the kitchen or living area of one of their homes. Their activities may include, but are not limited to, writing in a diary, stirring cornbread mix, sewing, and reading the Bible. They may sit at small, rustic table/s or in rocking chairs, or be situated any other way the director sees fit. The characters may converse with the audience as well as with each other, the audience being like a visitor who steps in saying, "What's going on here?"

#### **SCENE 1**

(AT RISE: The WOMEN are together in one room, each doing something different: sewing, writing, reading or cooking.)

THELMA: (Looking up from diary.) The men have gone hunting already this morning. They promised venison, duck, and a fat goose for dinner. In a little while, we women will begin cooking, for today we celebrate our first year in the new world.

ELIZABETH: (Looking up from Bible.) Celebrate? Maybe you can celebrate, but I can't. My husband is dead, my little boy ... dead. Oh, how I long to feel his tiny arms around my neck. And I need my Jonathan so much. I am so lonely, I don't know how I can stand one more day.

THELMA: In England, my husband told me, "There are settlers already established in the Virginia Colony, and they will help us get started." Well, we aren't in the Virginia Colony. We are in Plymouth, and there are no settlers here. None but us. And the only help we've had came from the natives.
